

At just over 17HH Fab is the tallest horse at *Reins*. He might be big but he is a real sweetheart and loves to get kisses and a few scratches on the neck. Fab loves being around children and has become a firm favorite with everyone since his arrival at the barn.

Before joining *Reins* Fab lived in Southern California and used to compete in Equitation classes with his owner Dominique. #### THE SPRING HORSE FACT

Horses are measured in hands. Each Hand is the equivalent of 4 inches. Expressed HH. So Fab is 4x17 hands = 68 inches or 17HH.

This is an ancient measurement based on the breadth of an adult human hand.

Horses are measured from the ground to the withers, which are the part of the horse just in front of where your saddle goes.

#### WHAT IS A SIDE-WALKER?

of the volunteer team at *Reins* as their whole focus is on keeping the rider safe. While the horse handler is focused on ensuring the horse does his job properly and safely, the side-walker is alert to what the rider is doing. It is easy for some of our riders to get distracted by their surroundings and

losing concentration on horseback is never a good plan. Side-walkers assist instructors to get riders focus back on the riding lesson.

They also help our non-independent riders stay in the saddle by holding on in a way that maximizes rider safety but is not uncomfortable for the rider. Side-walkers have to be reasonably fit, if the horse is trotting, they need to run alongside to keep hold of the rider and there is lots of walking, you'll easily get your 10,000 steps in!

When a rider uses the ramp to mount, there is lots of team work, involving up to 2 sidewalkers and an instructor all making sure the rider mounts safely. The horse handler needs to make sure they stay close enough to the ramp all the way to the bottom so the poor side-walker doesn't need to jump off early to stay with their rider – a bit of agility helps here!
